Everest from the North Michael Otis

May 19, 2001: After breaking route up the North Col, conditioning the climb, and fixing ropes on the way to the summit, Terry LaFrance of Albany, NY and Michael Otis of Phoenix were the first group to summit Mt. Everest in the 2001 climbing season. Remarkably, this climb consisted of Michael, Terry, and four Sherpas.

Michael began mountaineering in the mid-90s, and in 1999 topped off the western hemisphere with a climb of Aconcagua. While on that mountain he first gave serious consideration to climbing in the Himalaya. Two years later he was taking photographs on the summit of Mt. Everest.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER —

President's Corner - A Year in Review February 2002

The AMC's membership totaled 518 at year-end 2001. Thank you all for making another good year for the Club. We always need to give a word of thanks to our volunteers, whether they be our club leaders, the school instructors and helpers, the Outing Leaders, and everyone else who makes the Club go 'round.

A lot was accomplished this past year. Much the Club's volunteer administrative efforts went into reviewing and updating Club policies and guidelines and considering various risk management issues. The Club graduated 81 individuals through its Basic Rock School, 56 through its Anchors and Advanced Ropework School, and 31 through its Lead School. A similar number of "assistant instructors" came back to help teach these courses. In addition over 20 AMC'ers took Basic Ice Climbing and 12 went on AMC sponsored multi-pitch ice climbing Outings.

The basic snow skills class, Glacier Travel and Crevasse Rescue, was attended by 20 AMC'ers. Other special interest offerings in Map and Compass, Wilderness First Aid, and Basic Survival attracted significant participation.

AMC'ers continued their tradition of volunteerism and spend considerable hours with trash pick-ups in the Queen Creek area and at the Grand Canyon. Volunteers also assisted a local Hispanic youth organization being introduced to rock climbing. The committee chairs and the Board put in significant hours helping the Club and reaching out into the community and we made significant strides in increasing channels of ommunication and access to club decision making.

Club members continued their mountaineering interests with private and guided ascents throughout North and South America, and treks worldwide.

The Club continues to monitor local access issues and has been involved in the forefront of access issues across Arizona and hopefully the City of Scottsdale will open Pinnacle Peak Park. We are even helping fund a portable lavatory at Jack's Canyon.

Let's hope 2002 is as good and as safe a year as was 2001.

ACCESS REPORT — Jennifer Davies

Devil's Canyon - Queen Creek

Questions have come up recently regarding the closure of the access road to Devil's Canyon in Queen Creek. Yes the road to Devil's Canyon is closed, however, the climbing areas are not. Kendrick is mapping out a copper ore body in this area and after much debate, the Ranger station for Coconino National Forest has decided to close the access road for this area. However, again, I repeat, the climbing is still open. You are not allowed to drive your car on the road, but feel free to get out and stretch those legs. Plus, if you have driven the road you know that it's faster to hike it anyways! The road should be reopened sometime later this year – maybe early summer.

Update on Pinnacle Peak Opening

I wish I could write down the date and time of the Grand Re-Opening party for Pinnacle Peak. Unfortunately, I'm not able to. Although construction of the trailhead facilities are well underway, work is not progressing as quickly as the City of Scottsdale had expected. A new Grand Opening date has not yet been announced, but as soon as I hear something, I will be in touch.

Note that the Park is still closed to the public until construction of the trailhead facilities are complete. There is no legal access to the Peak at this time.

Further, the City of Scottsdale is still looking for volunteers for a variety of jobs once the park opens. Please contact me if you have an interest or any questions.

McDowell Sonoran Land Trust Update

There have been several reports over the past month about cars parked at a Preserve trailhead at the northernmost end of Alma School Road being broken into. Please be careful and report any activity to the Scottsdale Police Department.

Also, if any of you have visited the Browns Ranch area in the northern part of the Preserve, you will see native tree seedlings that have been planted as part of a habitat restoration project overseen by the Center for Native and Urban Wildlife in cooperation with the McDowell Sonoran Land Trust and the City's Preservation Unit. Please respect and stay out of the roped off areas so the trees can grow.

Seasonal Closures

It is that time of year again for seasonal closures in parts of Arizona. Here is an update:

Cochise Stronghold: There are several restrictions in Cochise Stronghold due to Peregrine Falcon nesting. Dates of closures are from February 15th through June 30th. Areas included in the closure are all routes on the Rockfellow Group (including End Pinnacle, Rockfellow Dome, Bastion Towers, Lost Tower, Hawk Pinnacle, Buzzard's Roost, and Chay Desa Tsay), all routes on Waterfall Dome, all routes of Squaretop and Lower Squaretop, all routes on Cochise Dome (including What's My Line Dome), and Dome Park. Please contact me if you have a question about any of these areas, or contact the Cochise Ranger Station at (520) 826-3593.

Granite Mountain and Thumb Butte: Traditionally, there have been closures in this area also due to Peregrine Falcon nesting. Areas have included the entire rock face of Granite Mountain, the rim above the rock face, and the north side of Thumb Butte. There has been some talk of expanding the Thumb Butte closure to the south side also. If you are planning on climbing in this area, it would be best to contact the Ranger for more information. Closure dates run from February 1st through mid-July. The Ranger who handles this area is out of the office as of time of publication of our newsletter so I could not confirm dates and areas. If there are any major changes to these closures, I will provide an update to the AMC membership. Also, if you plan on climbing in this area, you may contact the ranger office at (928) 771-4733 for updated information.

Mount Lemmon: There are several different restrictions and closures in this area. Some portions of the Pusch Ridge Wilderness are closed from January 1st through April 30th due to Bighorn Sheep. Barnum Rock will be closed from February 1st through August 31st because of peregrines and other species. Areas closed from March 15th through June 30th include Rappel Rock, Raven Rock, the Fortress, Branching-Out Crag, and some routes on Panorama Wall. Further information on these areas can be obtained by calling (520) 749-8700.

<u>Camel's Head</u>: From early-March through the end of May, there are climbing restrictions on the Camel's Head. For more information, please contact the City of Phoenix Parks department at (602) 261-8318.

WHAT YOU NEED TO BRING FOR THE FIRST CLASS:

• Dress casually; the class will be held outside, so bring warm clothes or not, depending on the weather

WHAT IS PROVIDED BY THE AMC:

- Technical climbing gear that will be used for the school (<u>and is yours to keep</u>): 1 belay/rappel device, 2 non-locking carabiners, 3 locking carabiners, 4 prusiks, one 5' sling (subject to change)
- Harness and helmet provided free by the AMC for the duration of the class if needed
- Basic climbing textbook
- Instruction through all phases of the class
- Discounts from local retailers on other climbing gear

<u>WHAT IS RECOMMENDED FOR THE CLASS:</u> Climbing shoes are recommended. The AMC rents climbing shoes, on a first-come, first-serve basis on the **second** night of class for \$10 for the class. We will discuss what to look for in a shoe on the first night of class.

PAPERWORK: You will be required to read, fill out and sign an AMC release of liability on the first night of class. Students under 18 MUST have the release signed by their parent or guardian (no students under 14 please; students 14-15 years of age must be accompanied by an older adult).

CLASS FEE: \$125 plus membership if not already a member (\$25 for an individual and \$30 for a family).

LEAD CLIMBING SCHOOL

ARIZONA MOUNTAINEERING CLUB

PURPOSE

This is an advanced climbing class. Even if you don't plan on leading, you will learn much about the dynamics of climbing, and it will make you a safer climber. There will be no "true" lead climbs during the class. Protecting a climb is a different skill from climbing itself. We will talk about the dynamics of lead falls, how to prepare for a climb, the differences between single-pitch and multi-pitch, the differences between bolted routes and natural pro, and we will provide actual leading exercises.

ITEMS YOU NEED FOR THE CLASS:
