Board Meeting Minutes: December 4, 2006

Board Members Present: John Keedy, Dave McClintic, Bill Fallon, Clay Vollmer, Erik Filsinger

Meeting called to order at 7:20 p.m. by Vice President Robert England.

Minutes of the December 4, 2006 Board meeting were reviewed and approved.

Treasurer's Report. Clay Vollmer presented the year-end Treasurer's Report. It was reviewed and a motion made to approve them as corrected. The motion was seconded and passed. The corrections were as follows:

Three noted corrections were made to the Year End financial statements:

1. Check to Erik for the Access Fund contribution (Land Advocacy:

Organizational Contributions.

- 2. Check to Robert for Newsletter software (Newsletter: Other).
- 3. Date correction to December 31, 2006 in the Transaction Report.
- 4. The \$2,100.47 for the Outing Gear account was last year's amount was corrected to \$2,147.40 on the Balance Sheet and the Newsletter tab.

Committee Reports

<u>Elections</u> – Dave Van Hook will send out electronic notification for the Mail Ballots for the January elections.

<u>Mountaineering</u> – Beginning Ice Climbing filling up. Glacier Travel Class to be scheduled for April.

Land Advocacy – Erik Filsinger presented an update about several local jurisdictions where progress is being made in developing dialogues with land managers and positive relationships are being built. These include Scottsdale, Phoenix, and Maricopa County. As the Land Advocacy Chair, Erik is authorized on behalf of the AMC to pursue the development of climbing area maps and climbing policies. This is especially true of situations where the timing may be a good one to hold such discussions. Outings – Erik Filsinger and Frank Vers have prepared a summary of Outing Leader activities for the year. Names of the Outing Leaders who have earned a dues waiver for 2007 will be posted. Inactive Outing Leaders (no activities in 2006) will be placed in inactive status and their names removed from the AMC Newsletter listing until they lead at least one official AMC Outing.

<u>T&S</u> – location of the schools was discussed. Bill and John will meet with other land users on State Land and plan a strategy for discussions with the State Land Department. The Advanced Climbing Seminars currently being discussed or scheduled was lead by Clay Vollmer. He stated that he has arranged for Paul Diefenderfer to hold a Roped Soloing Seminar on February 10. Clay will ask for \$30 per person for the event. Clay also discussed an Aid Climbing Seminar.

Membership stands at 384.

Old Business

Outing Policy. John reviewed the feedback he had received previously on the Outing Procedure policy and it was moved, seconded and approved to adopt it as part of official club policies. Robert England will incorporate it into the official club documents located on the AMC website. The policy states:

Outing Procedure

A.Proposing and AMC Rock Climbing Outing

a.All AMC rock climbing outings must be conducted by an Outing Leader.

b. All AMC rock climbing outings must be approved by the Outings Chair prior to being published in the Mountaineer Newsletter, web site or the AMC email distribution.

c.Outing Leaders submit a completed AMC Outing Plan or AMC Multi-pitch and Back Country Outing plan to the Outing Chair for approval. These can be found in the Members Only area of the Web Site under Forms.

d.Outing Plans for the following month need to be submitted to the Outing Chair no later than one week prior to the Board Meeting to allow time for approval, publication in the newsletter and Board action if required.

e.Outing Leaders should have in their possession at the outing the following;

- •Activity Release form to be completed for the outing
- •Emergency Contact List
- •Incident Report Form
- •State Land Permit (If outing is on State Land)
- •Membership Application and Release Form

f.The Outing Leader should email a copy of the approved Outing Plan to all

participants along with meeting and driving directions/map. g.After the outing, the completed Activity Release Form should be sent to the AMC Secretary, whose address is at the bottom of that form.

<u>Club Calendar</u>. The club calendar was approved and will be posted on the AMC website.

Email Transition. Robert England will be taking over the official club email distribution from Tricia Rudloff. Thank you, Tricia, for your service over the past year. Only official representatives of the AMC acting in their official capacity related to club business can send materials to Robert for his distribution.

New Business

Reimbursement for Continuing Education Classes. Following the Club Policy on reimbursement for expenses for qualified club representatives to attend Board approved continuing education classes, the Board entertained, seconded and approved a motion to reimburse half of the cost of tuition up to a maximum cost of \$250 per person so that Bill Fallon, Clay Vollmer, Robert England, Mike Knarzer, and the to be determined lead instructor for the AARS school could attend an officially offered and sanction Top Rope Site Manager Class of the American Mountain Guides Association.

Educational Session for Board on Club's Policies and Procedures. At the first Board meeting for the new members, Erik and Robert will produce copies of the documents and Erik will lead a brief overview of the club documents, policies and procedures and their intended use within the club.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:12 p.m.



Lead Climbing School

Arizona Mountaineering Club - Spring 2007

This is an advanced climbing class. Even if you don't plan on leading, you will learn much about the dynamics of climbing, and it will make you a safer climber. Protecting a climb is a different skill from climbing itself. We will talk about the dynamics of lead falls, how to prepare for a climb, the differences between single-pitch and multi-pitch, and the differences between clipping bolts and placing natural pro. There will be no "true" lead climbs during the class, but we will provide simulated leading exercises.

Class curriculum:

Tue Lecture, slide show: introduction, the lead fall, equipment

Wed Lecture, slide show: equipment (continued); the process and techniques of leading Thu Lecture, slide show: multi-pitch techniques, the descent, leader rescue, aid climbing

Sat Hands-on practice: natural pro placement (Prescott)

Sun Hands-on practice: leading on bolts (Prescott or Scottsdale)

All pro that you own, which may include cams, hexes, wired nuts, Tri-cams, etc.

Consider combining with another person to have enough gear

Hiking boots or shoes with stiff soles for Saturday, climbing shoes for Sunday

Optional: kneepads for Saturday (\$3–6 at Home Depot, \$5 volleyball pads at sporting goods stores)

The Arizona Mountaineering Club (AMC) has been teaching basic rock climbing for over 35 years. We place maximum emphasis on safety and self-rescue. This is a beginning climbing class. We will teach you equipment care and usage, rope handling, climbing knots, belaying, rappelling, climbing techniques, and self-rescue. Enrollment fills up quickly, so don't delay; make a reservation to join us soon!

Experience required: None. Even if you have never climbed a tree before, this class is for you.

What is provided by the AMC:

- Technical climbing gear that will be used for the school (and is yours to keep): 1 belay/rappel device, 2 non-locking carabiners, 3 locking carabiners, 4 prusiks, one 5' sling (subject to change)
- Harness and helmet provided free by the AMC for the duration of the class if needed
- Basic climbing textbook
- Instruction through all phases of the class
- Discounts from local retailers on climbing gear

Equipment recommended for the class: You will wear a climbing harness at every class, so dress casually. Most sessions will be held outside, so watch the weather. Climbing shoes are recommended for the weekend sessions only. The AMC rents climbing shoes on a first-come, first-serve basis on the **second** night of class for \$10 for the class. We will discuss what to look for in a shoe on the first night of class.

Paperwork: You will be required to read, fill out and sign an AMC release of liability on the first night of class. Students under 18 must have the release signed by their parent or guardian (no students under 14 please; students 14-15 years of age must be accompanied by an older adult).

Class fee: \$160 plus membership if not already a member (\$15 for an individual and \$18 for a family). Membership is good through Dec., 2006.

Registration: The class is limited to 40 students. To reserve a spot, send a check for \$160 + membership cost (see Class Fee above) made out to AMC Basic School. 
"You can't shoot adventure from a safe distance."



AMC Advanced Climbing Seminars

Advanced Climbing Seminars (ACS) are Born

The AMC is proud to announce the beginning of a new series of educational and on-rock practical climbing seminars for more advanced climbers. The first seminar, Rope Soloing, is scheduled for February 10. See details elsewhere in this issue.

The purpose of ACS is to provide information and opportunities for practical experience around aspects of climbing that are not offered during the club's Basic, Anchors and Lead Schools. ACS participation requirements will vary with the course offered, but generally include current AMC membership, attendance at Basic, Anchors & Lead Schools and 1-2 years leading experience.

Instructors are chosen based upon their skills and experience in the subject matter and their ability to teach.

ACSs generally will have a seminar coordinator, who may or may not also be the instructor, who is responsible for newsletter and email announcements, enrollment, fielding questions, gathering gear and coordinating the overall production of the seminar. This "coordinator" role frees the instructor from the burden of paperwork, detail and enables them to concentrate on presenting the material.

Beyond Rope Soloing, we are planning seminars on Aid-Climbing, Women's Climbing Issues, New Leaders, Ice Climbing, Short and Long Multi-Pitch Techniques, etc. We may also offer Wilderness First Aid (First Responder) and other related subjects. A nominal fee will be charged for the seminars, between \$20-\$40. The goal is to offer popular seminars twice a year, where there is interest.

Clay Vollmer, as Co-Chair of Training & Schools, is the ACS coordinator. We are looking for individuals to instruct seminars or to act as seminar coordinators. Please contact Clay at wollmer@rice.edu or 602.595.7266 if you are interested.

First Advanced Climbing Seminar (ACS) Offering: Rope Soloing!

The AMC's very first Advanced Climbing Seminar, Rope Soloing, will be offered beginning at 9AM on February 10th at a popular local crag. (For more details about the Arizona Mountaineering Club's Advanced Climbing Seminars, please see ACS "birth" announcement article elsewhere in this issue.)

Paul Dief, owner of the Phoenix Rock Gym and an Arizona climbing legend, has agreed to share his experience with a couple of soloing devices that he uses, one for toprope and one for leading. Paul, a former 10-time AMC president, is active with Access Fund issues in Arizona and is a climbing consultant and a rope access expert. He has consulted with many firms and agencies on "difficult to access" locations.



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

Become an AMC Outing Leader

General requirements for becoming an AMC outing leader:

- Be a member for at least one year
- Take the Basic, Anchors and Lead classes (or equivalents)
- Complete a basic first aid and CPR class (8 hours or more)
- Submit an application to the Classification Chairperson
- Apprentice on at least three outings with approved outing leaders
- Get recommendation from at least five current outing leaders (including those from apprentice outings)
- Be approved by the Board of Directors.

Footnotes: Car-pooling is optional on all outings and is not part of the outing. The outing begins at the trailhead designated by the Outing Leader and ends at the same place. Each participant should bring a First Aid kit. If you leave the outing, with or without the leader's permission, you are considered to be on your own until you rejoin the group. Each participant will be required to sign an AMC Activity Release Form at the beginning of the outing. Participation in AMC outings requires club membership. Outings vary in degree of danger. If any AMC equipment is used for the outing, the participants using that equipment are responsible for checking the equipment before use and for using the equipment properly and in the safest manner possible. The campsite, where possible, may be reserved and paid for by the AMC. Parking may be first-come, first-served.

Beginning Ice Climbing and Avalanche Awareness:

Learn to ice climb from the pros at Southwest Adventure Guides in Durango, CO. This introductory level course will take place over President's Day weekend, and will be held in Cascade Canyon, home to a wide variety of ice and mixed climbing terrain, and about a 20 minute drive from Durango. The 2 day ice course will cover current ice climbing equipment and its use, belaying and rappelling (as they apply to ice climbing), climbing technique (footwork, body position, tool placement), anchor construction, and a host of other topics related to the sport of ice climbing. It's a jam packed weekend, with less talking and more climbing! The third day of the course will be spent on Coal Bank Pass completing our 1 day Avalanche Awareness Course. This is a great follow up to the previous 2 days of ice climbing, and a prerequisite for those who would like to sign up for our Multi-Pitch Ice Course, either this year or next. The class was full last year with 12 people, so make sure to sign up early!

Course Cost: \$305 per person (includes all climbing equipment--boots, crampons, tools, ropes, etc.)

Prerequisites: Basic Rock Climbing

Multipitch Ice Climbing Class:

Learn the fundamentals of multipitch ice climbing in Silverton and/or Ouray, Colorado. This course is specifically designed for those who have successfully completed our Beginner's Ice Climbing and Avalanche Awareness Course, or for those who have previous ice climbing experience. This course will take place in either Silverton or Ouray, Colorado depending upon current ice and avalanche conditions. In Silverton, we will tackle routes in Eureka Canyon, home to classic routes like Goldrush, Stairway to Heaven, Whorehouse Ice Hose, 2nd Gully, and Road to Nowhere. The course will cover topics such as, proper ice lead climbing gear (ice screws, screamers, ropes, tools, etc.), effective racking techniques to manage gear while on lead, belaying and rappelling strategies, ice climbing technique, time management, rescue considerations, descent options, as well as mental

attitude and commitment. Participants will need to be prepared to climb as many as 6 pitches of ice per day. The course will have a 2:1 participant-to-guide ratio, ensuring the highest level of safety and personalized instruction.
