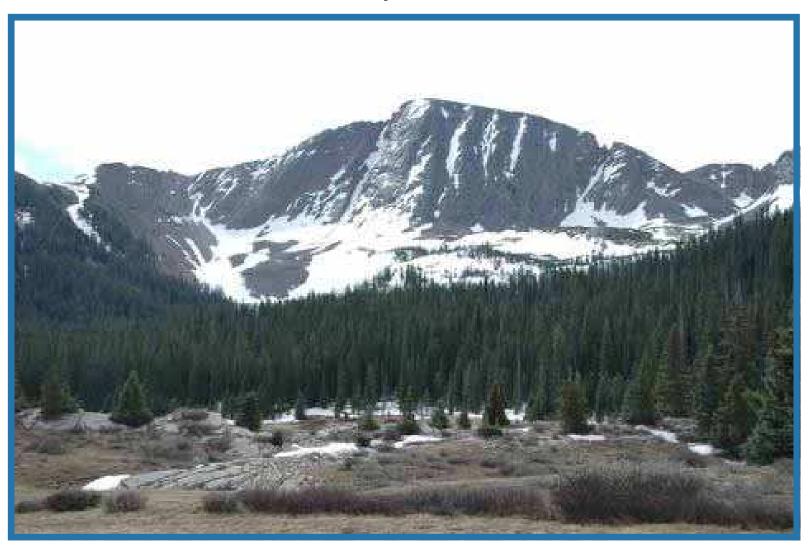

Minutes of the AMC Board Meeting: June 5, 2006

Board members present: John Keedy, Jutta Ulrich, Bill Fallon, Dave Van Hook, Clay Vollmer, Erik Filsinger

An Executive Session was held beginning at 7:05 p.m. Justin York, Jason Garvin, and Matt Pearcy were approved as Multipitch Outing Leaders, pending completion of First Aid and CPR. Bill Fallon and Bruce McHenry were approved as Multipitch Outing Leaders.

The regular Board meeting was called to order at 7:55 p.m.

Approval of Minutes: The Minutes of the May 8, 2006 Board meeting were approved.

Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer's Report was approved as presented.

President's Update:

John Keedy lead a discussion about Member Meeting attendance. Topics included location, day of the week, nature of presentation/speaker, and notice/advertising. Currently the model for member meetings has been to have about 6 speakers a year, 4 climbing gym sessions, and two special events like the gear swap and Christmas program. A general discussion surrounded the notion of trying to get a few, maybe 4 for the year, quality speakers and seek other venues for the remaining member meetings. It was decided to ask the Programs chair to obtain a quality speaker for August and for October member meetings. An effort will be made to line those speakers up well ahead of time and to make sure the climbing community is aware of the opportunities.

John Keedy indicated that the quickness with which his Mt. Eldun Top Rope Outing filled up is evidence of a real demand for this type of outing. He will email the Outing Leaders to solicit more outings.

Other Business:

A motion was made, seconded and approved to appoint Bill Fallon and Clay Vollmer as Co-Chairs of the T&S Committee. They will allocate their time and duties among themselves and other T&S committee members.

Consistent with the mission of the event to highlight beneficial activities with regard to climbing in a local crag, Erik Filsinger and John Keedy will coordinate with the City of Scottsdale to hold the annual Adopt-A-Crag Event somewhere in the north McDowells in conjunction with Preserve Month in Scottsdale, thought to be held in October.

Outing Leader Training Programs will be placed under the responsibility of T&S. Bill and Clay will review and report back to the Board.

Jeff Nagel and Robert England are working out the mechanics of producing a new Club Brochure.

Clay Vollmer will distribute materials related to the Cody Lundin Survival Seminar to be offered to club members.

Meeting adjourned at 9:00 p.m.

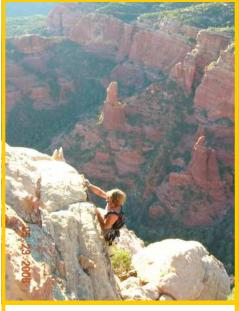


Base camp briefing ...

This Ain't No Sport Climb!

In is his guidebook A Better Way To Die Tim Toula says that recommending a Sedona route is like handing a bottle of nitro to an epileptic friend. That being said, reading the route description of Earth Angel leaves it begging to be climbed. "A 1000 foot spire considered by Sedona aficionados to be perhaps the best climb in

Sedona" was inspiration enough to inspire Justin York, Mike Knarzer and I to leave Phoenix at 5 am to go climb Earth Angel. The approach is along a creek bed that gradually leaves the houses and city sounds of Sedona behind. A scramble up a loose talus slope populated by dense underbrush and yucca cacti led to the base of the climb. The first pitch is a wandering traverse that ends at the beginning of a chimney system. It was seconding Mike on this pitch that I learned about desert sandstone when a bomber, and large, foothold disappeared in a puff of dust when I weighted it, leaving my heart in my throat and my weight on the rope. Justin linked the second and third pitches into one long lead. The pitches led up a chimney system that served to funnel the abundant loose rock down onto the people below. Arriving at the top of Justin's lead brought us face to face with the crux pitch of the climb, a 5.10 overhanging off-width crack, which Mike led clean and in fine style. Mike linked the 5th and 6th pitches together in one long lead. This pitch starts as a 5.9 crack and transitions into a face climb that, at one point, is protected by a piton that was made in someone's garage and then pounded into the rock sometime in

the middle of the last century. I led the final pitch, a face climb that culminates in a summit that has one of the most spectacular vistas I have ever seen. We took a few photos and, due to the fact that the shadows were getting long, began a series of three double rope rappels to get off of the spire. The guidebooks say that there are four rappels; however, due to the setting sun and the poison ivy populating the top of the fourth rappel ledge we



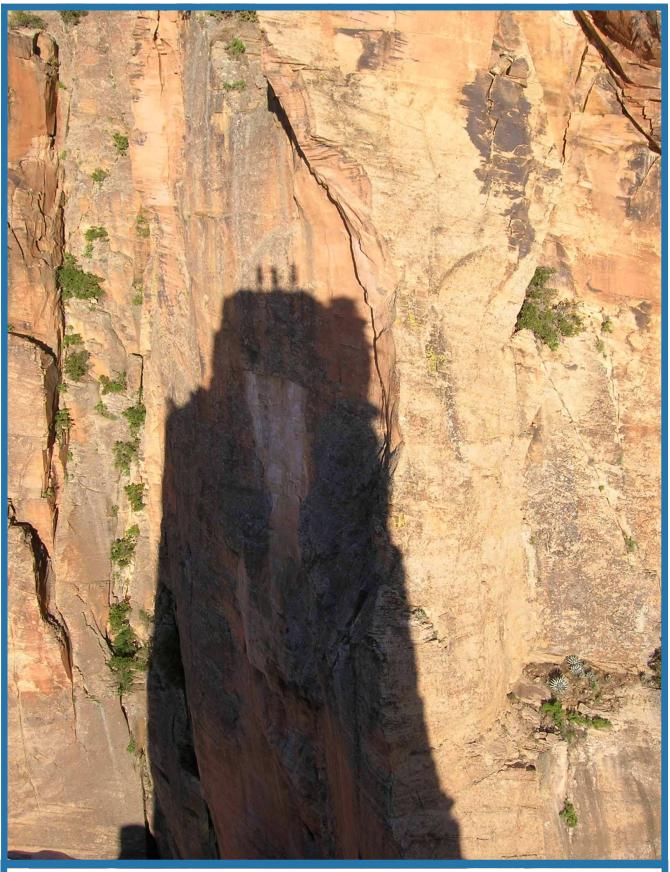

decided that the third rap would get us very close to the ground and leave us with an easy down climb. Much to my satisfaction, the ropes just touched the ground and we were off. All that remained was the hike back to the car through a cloudless Sedona night. After a pit stop for some much needed food we hit the road for home and rolled into phoenix about 1:30 in the morning. My thanks to Mike and Justin for one of the best climbing trips yet.

Become an AMC Outing Leader

General requirements for becoming an AMC outing leader:

- Be a member for at least one year
- Take the Basic, Anchors and Lead classes (or equivalents)
- Complete a basic first aid and CPR class (8 hours or more)
- Submit an application to the Classification Chairperson
- Apprentice on at least three outings with approved outing leaders
- Get recommendation from at least five current outing leaders (including those from apprentice outings)
- Be approved by the Board of Directors.

AMC Outings

Please note: It is suggested that Outing participants donate gas money to the Outing Leader, and that carpoolers share the cost of gas for the driver. See footnotes below for other info about outings.

Footnotes: Car-pooling is optional on all outings and is not part of the outing. The outing begins at the trailhead designated by the Outing Leader and ends at the same place. Each participant should bring a First Aid kit. If you leave the outing, with or without the leader's permission, you are considered to be on your own until you rejoin the group. Each participant will be required to sign an AMC Activity Release Form at the beginning of the outing. Participation in AMC outings requires club membership. Outings vary in degree of danger. When you participate in an outing you should be both physically and mentally prepared and equipped with the appropriate gear. You should always be aware of the risks involved in outdoor activities and conduct yourselves accordingly. The Outing Leader is not responsible for your safety; you are. Please contact the Outing Leader before going on an outing, discussing your capabilities with the Outing Leader. You must be over 18 years of age to participate, or must be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult, and obtain prior consent from the Outing Leader. Those accompanying minors are responsible for the minor's safety.

If they are organized by an AMC Outing Leader, the Leader will only be responsible for organizing the time, date, meeting places, and any necessary camping. The AMC Outing Leader may also set anchors, but will not be responsible for supervising any climbing activity or for monitoring the anchors they set. Participants are responsible for their own climbing activities, their own climbing partners, and for monitoring anchors, whether set by an AMC Outing Leader or not. Participants are also responsible for their own conduct and safety at the campsite and during any approaches to and from the climbing areas. If any AMC equipment is used for the outing, the participants using that equipment are responsible for checking the equipment before use and for using the equipment properly and in the safest manner possible. The campsite, where possible, may be reserved and paid for by the AMC. Parking may be first-come, first-served.

Outings listed in this section are not AMC sanctioned outings. Any AMC member can list an event he or she is planning and which is open to other AMC members. The member does not have to be an approved AMC Outing Leader. If you wish to participate you should be physically and mentally prepared with the appropriate gear and should contact the member planning the outing.
