

MINUTES OF THE AMC BOARD MEETING: 7/9/01

Minutes - AMC Board Meeting July 9, 2001

Board members present: Ward, Hoffman, Query, Stinson, McHenry, Filsinger

Committee Chairs present: Davies, Thomas, Vegors

Members present: Conner, Demlong

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. at Los Olivos SeniorCenter.

The Treasurer's Report was circulated and approved.

The President welcomed Bill Demlong, who is a liability attorney and will help the Club in its risk management activities and the review of Club documents. Erik asked that in order to manage the commitment from Bill all legal questions be routed first to him and he will relay requests to Bill.

The President gave an overview of the relationship of various types of Club documents, e. g., the Articles of Incorporation, the By-Laws, Standing Rules, Club Policies, Guidelines, and Procedures. The Board adopted those concepts as a working scheme to help guide the development of Club policies and procedures.

Jeff Nagel resigned as Vice President and Classification Co-Chair. The Board thanked him for his years of service. Scott Hoffman will assume the duties of Classification Chair.

After a discussion of the issues involved, the Board voted that it was consistent with the By-Laws to use an electronic notification of the membership and a posting on the website of an election to fill the one or two seats that may be vacant due to Jeff's notice of resignation. The election(s) will be held at the July membership meeting.

The Board appointed Jen Davies as the new Access Chair for the AMC. She will work closely with others actively involved with access issues, including the Access Fund, Wayne Schroeter, and Bill Berkely.

The Board discussed and approved two commercially offered outings/classes. The AMC has been afforded the opportunity to take part in a Wilderness First Aid class offered by NOLS and sponsored by the Girl Scouts of America. The Board authorized Martin Combs to coordinate the participation by individual AMC members. This function is announcedfor August 2001 elsewhere in this bulletin.

Secondly, Jen Davies will coordinate for the Club offering a Wilderness Survival Class given by Cody Lundin in August 2001. It is also being announced separately from these minutes.

Tim Ward is coordinating AMC participation with a Latino police officers-sponsored youth group in giving them an introduction to climbing. Details will be forthcoming and will involve AMC volunteers.

The Board authorized Jen Davies to work with the Access Fund to make our annual contribution of \$500 in the name of Noel Suderer.

Consistent with protocol authorized in the By-Laws, the Board voted to bring a budget override vote to the July membership meeting to authorize the expenditure of \$375 for year 2001 for an additional temporary toilet at Jack's Canyon.

As the new Access Chair, Jen Davies will work with Wayne and others actively involved in the Pinnacle Peak efforts and with the City of Scottsdale to make sure that the AMC has an active role in the Grand Opening of the new Pinnacle Peak park scheduled for this Fall.

Separately from these minutes the Board adopted protocols for electronic approval of certain issues and for its responses to electronic inquiries made to it. It also adopted a Standing Rule on Executive Meetings that is published elsewhere in this newsletter.

Because of the number of agenda items not addressed at this meeting, a second meeting was scheduled for the following Monday. It's minutes will be reported elsewhere in the newsletter.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

STUDY TO MODEL CLIMBER USE IN ARIZONA WILDERNESS AREAS

The Access Fund has granted \$4,000 to the University of Arizona towards a two-year post-graduate study through the Department of Renewable Natural Resources.

The study, carried out by Erik Murdock, will model and inventory rock climber use in Wilderness areas. Data collected will allow researchers to create a model that can be adjusted to predict the implications of changes in Wilderness policy.

Although the study will be carried out in California and Arizona wilderness areas, the data set and model will have application at other areas. This project supports the Access Fund's work in climbing management and resource protection.

THE AMC GRENADIERS OUTING — July 2001

On Saturday June 23, 2001 Mark Hubble, Jim Kistler, Susan and Zack Morris and I met at the 10,600 foot Molas Pass Trailhead for an official AMC backpacking and climbing trip into the Grenadier Range of southwest Colorado. The Grenadiers are known for being relatively unimpacted by historic mining activities and for their challenging mountaineering. The range tends to have sharp relief with many cliff features on the beautiful quartzite peaks. These are the rugged peaks seen to the east from Molas Pass and points north on the road to Silverton.

Our objectives involved climbing as many as the peaks in the Vestal Basin as time would permit, including Arrow Peak (13,803), Vestal Peak (13,864), and the three Trinity Peaks, West (13765), Middle (13,805), and East (13,745). All are high 13'ers and would be rated mostly 4th class climbing, with certain route options getting into solid 5th class rock climbing.

After putting on those disgustingly heavy packs full of 9 days of provisions and technical hardware, we proceeded down (yes, down) 4 miles to the Animas River at 8,900 feet. The final portion of the trail down involved countless (we lost count somewhere over 25) switchbacks. There we crossed the narrow gauge train tracks and headed uphill along the Colorado trail into the Elk Creek drainage.

As a side note, I planned the trip without taking the train to gain the added day of acclimatization and to keep expenses down. Others considering this trip could consider taking the train, which has at least 4 different departure times from Durango or Silverton. While expensive the train would avoid 4 miles of relatively steep backpacking.

We were into the summer storm pattern. Afternoon rain showers and thunderstorms impacted us on our backpack as well as pretty much each day of the trip. The hike up the Colorado Trail into Elk Creek drainage was a sudden departure from the relative ease of going downhill. Not being acclimatized I called a halt for the day about 1 to 2 miles up the Valley in time to set up camp and cook in the remaining daylight.

The next morning we concluded the 3-mile hike from the Animas up to some beaver ponds that marked the entrance to the Vestal Creek drainage coming in from the south. Some tricky stream

crossing of Elk Creek on shaky logs and bushwhacking (it's worthwhile to search for a good crossing) placed us on the "trail" up to Vestal Basin.

Though Vestal Basin is a sought-after climber's destination, this side trail is far from maintained. It is steep and nasty. Logs have fallen over it at odd angles; sections have been washed out; did I mention it is steep? While it is only about 2 miles from the Beaver ponds up to the first camping area, the climb takes a good part of the day. That being said, we were most happy when we took a final turn into a meadowed area at 11,400 feet and found the best campsite in the whole valley unoccupied (any campsite at that point was the best possible!).

Actually, the campsite was excellent, a short distance across the stream. We were even provided with a good bridge. The site consisted of a woody knoll with several flat spots for tents with views up and down the valley. Rock benches provided ample sitting and cooking features. Water was plentiful. What more would you want – yes, the view up the north ridge of Arrow directly above camp outlined by Mike Covington's 5.6 to 5.7 route.

After the truly grueling backpack and the rapid rise from Phoenix to 11,400, we took a rest day on Monday. Of course, that turned out to be one of the best weather days of the trip, a fact to be lamented shortly.

We woke up at 4:00 a.m. on Wednesday for an attempt on the 5.4ish Wham Ridge of Vestal and were well on our way by 4:30 a.m.
Unfortunately rain during the night had soaked the willows and cloudy skies greeted our departure. We were wet within 100 yards of camp, at least those of us whose rainpants leaked like sieves. It was not far above the meadows that we could see the weather on the verge of deteriorating. By the time we had reached a major bench below Vestal and Arrow at about 12,000 feet, it was clear to me that our large party with one rope leader would not be attempting a major fifth class climb like the 1,500 foot-plus high Wham Ridge in such uncertain weather.

We turned our focus to Arrow Peak, also a peak with no easy way up but with the advantage of the start being close to our present position. After roping up, we did some low 5th class scrambling onto the Northeast Rib of Arrow.

Construction is

starting on the access trailhead. Plants have been tagged for relocation or salvage, and ground should have been broken the week of July 16. There was a delay in construction when the contractor said he couldn't start as planned in May. There are some very unhappy people in Scottsdale about this latest snafu—but not as unhappy as I am. The opening date is now projected to be late December, but I suspect the standard construction delays will push it to January.

Jen is working on Grand Opening ceremonies; stay tuned.

Jack's Canyon

Kerry Nodal, George Bain, Jonathan Koehn (all of NACC) and I met with Trish Callaghan of the Blue Ridge Ranger District of the Coconino National Forest to rough out a basic site plan for the parking/camping area at Jack's. The site plan includes parking, toilet, campsites, etc. Most people would like the area to stay basically as is, quiet and remote, and I think it will for quite a while. The main need is a permanent toilet, and the Forest Service needs to jump through hoops to define the need for one and to get it put in. NACC has been paying for the portable that has been there for the past year through a grant from the Access Fund, and the grant has been renewed for another year based on the fact that the Forest Service is moving ahead with the plan to install a permanent one. In addition, the AMC will pay for a second one (pending membership approval at the July meeting) through October, since one does not seem sufficient. I have asked that the AMC budget for the second one for 7 months next year as welf. During the winter months, usage drops off and the number of cleanings drops to every two weeks instead of weekly, and we only need one unit, but during prime time, cleanings are weekly and we need both. Now that Trish has a basic site plan, she can budget money to install the permanent toilet, which should be sometime in fall 2002 (although I am always skeptical of any government deadlines). The only part of the site plan to be implemented at first will be the parking and toilet; any further "modernization" may never be done, depending on the usage. The Winnebago crowd doesn't like to camp down so low; they like the tall trees. And no real signage is being put in to attract crowds.

Oak Creek Overlook

The Sedona Ranger District has approved in principle the plan to reopen the rest of the Overlook (Three Bears and three other areas). NACC members and I are meeting with Recreation Ranger Bill Stafford in August to move forward. It's not cast in concrete just yet, but we are hopeful.

THE CHASM YAWNS — CLEANUP 2001

"I got my first calls about this year's Grand Canyon cleanup in February!" reports Gary Youngblood (otherwise known as Gumby) who is again organizing AMC's annual over-the-rim cleanup at Arizona's Grand Canyon National Park.

He has received many calls since. It shows the intrinsic appeal our annual public service project has for climbers. Usually several people fly in from both east and west coasts to take part.

This year's event is September 29th.

Training — For those who have never helped out, Gumby will hold a trash-rappel training session at Papago Park on Saturday, September 15th, at 7:00 a.m. Meet at Elliot Ramada just west of Galvin Parkway. Because of the obvious downside of a mistake, AMC has developed a special rig to enable trash-pickers to lock-off at any point, prussic up and over the everpresent overhangs, and generally keep life on an even keel. This training is a must for first timers who want to go over the side.

For old timers who want a brush-up, he will hold a session on Thursday, September 27th - place and time to be announced in the September newsletter.

The clean up is a combined operation using the talents of members of the AMC, of Southern Arizona Search and Rescue Assn., and the of Central Arizona Mountain Rescue Assn. From 80 to

100 climbers normally participate.

The idea of picking up trash while suspended by a rope over a mile-deep chasm tickles many people's fancy, not to mention the acrophobic nerve center located under their wishbones. However, much of the pick-up work will be in an oak-brush thicket — albeit one growing on a 50-degree slope just above a 300-foot high cliff. The usual loot are hamburger wrappers, film boxes, hats, lens caps, styrofoam cups, old batteries, etc. There are occasional gems — broken beer bottles, diamond rings, murder weapons(?), dirty diapers.

Getting In —We go up Friday evening. The rangers at the entrance will let us into to park at no charge if we tell them we are there for the "Over

Camping —. We expect to be assigned one of the group sites not far past the entrance booth of Mather Campground. Snafus have happened two years out of three recently, however, so be prepared for last minute reassignments. No cars can overnight in the group areas but must be parked in the near corner of the commercial complex located a couple hundred yards northeast of the group site. If you wish to pay the fee, you can be assigned a regular site in the regular campsite loops farther up

the hill and camp within touching distance of your car, van, suv or pickup...

Cleanup Day — begins at 8:00 on Saturday morning unless rain or high winds cause a delay. If there is a delay you will learn of it at 8:00 Saturday morning. The normal assembly point is in the parking lot below El Tovar just south of the railroad tracks. That's where we will divvy up club gear and bodies and get our assignments. Grand Canyon rangers will help with crowd control. "Dammit, I paid my money and I'm gonna get out onto Mather Point".

Weather — Can vary from downright hot to a well developed snow/sleet storm. Come prepared for anything.

Equipment —

Rock climbing-type helmet required!

Boots — not climbing shoes.

Gloves

Three prusiks (4, 6 and 10')

Harness

Rappel Device

Three locking biners for your harness

Two 20-foot slings and lockers for anchors Plus hat, long sleeve shirt, sunscreen,

water, lunch, common sense, etc.

Procedure — More people are needed on top to set anchors and tend ropes and such than can actually go over the edge. You don't have to rappel to qualify to buy the T-shirt.

Party — Saturday night at Shoshone Point, 2.3 miles east of the AZ 64 "T" with the main park road — on the east rim road. Turn onto the dirt trail leading north at the sign. The point has a 270 degree view of the canyon, BBQ grills and picnic tables. Bring food and drink. AMC will provide charcoal.

Climb Sunday — Stay over and see how fossils work as handholds in one of the amphitheaters west along the south rim. We will break down soon after noon to allow time for the long drive home.

LAND NAVIGATION CLASS

For those who didn't have the "advantage" of military training, this class is definitely worth taking if you ever plan to be out of sight of your car or camp. It is considered one of the key parts of the "mountaineering" seminars AMC is holding on the first Tuesday of every month.

The course covers most of the basics of land navigation with a strong focus on the USGS 7.5 minute series topographic maps. Topics to be

covered include:

How to read USGS maps and how they are generated.

Map interpretation, focusing on the 7.5 min. quad series.

Navigation with map and compass, efen if you only have one of the two.

Altimeter and GPS integration to land navigation.

Numerous navigation techniques and tricks.

The course will include two nights of instruction with many visual aids and the students will be presented many hands-on exercises. There will also be one full day in Flagstaff (or alternate areas due to fire restrictions) to practice the newly acquired skills on a land navigation course that will be set up for the day. (It is amazing how an orange cone can hide. — ed.)

The charge for the course will be \$20 to cover the cost of duplicating student handouts and

various small useful goodies.

We climbed at the Ridgeline on Mt. Lemmon on Saturday. It's an easy area to set up, with fun, bolted face routes ranging from 5.5 to 5.10. Richard Balland, Rich Mc?, Jeff Hatfield, David Larimer, and I all led routes to set up the climbs. There were only 5 other people at that location and we did our best to work with them to share the routes. When the other groups were finished with a route, we'd set it up and we'd break down our climbs or move our ropes to let them climb if we were occupying a route they hadn't done yet. It was a bit hot in the sun, but there was shade to be found – and no afternoon rain, so we had nothing to complain about.

Around half of us camped out high on the mountain, fighting off swarms of mostly non-biting

insects until after dark.

Sunday morning, there was light rain as we gathered to go climb at the Druid. The showers quickly passed and we had another great day of sport climbing. We were joined by 6 more AMC members on Sunday, so still had a pretty big group. Two of the climbs can be set up from the top, and the rest have to be led. David Larimer, recovering nicely from his sprained ankle, led two routes and the Big Dog, Mick Strole, led another. We were all glad to see Mick and Sherrie back out on the rock!

Thunderstorms started rolling in around the time that we should start breaking down. We got everything packed up before the rain hit, but we all got a good soaking as we walked back to the cars. We stopped for dinner in Tucson and made it back to town at a decent hour.

Thanks to everyone who helped to lead the climbs, break them down, and haul ropes!

The route follows a sloping gully, the right half of lwhich was filled with snow. The left half was smooth (i.e., devoid of features). About half way up the Rib it began to rain and although the route was not steep, the smooth, frictionless rock became very slippery. We decided therefore that the better half of valor was to retreat safely and we belayed back down, actually finding an easier start to the route in the process. We were back in camp early for a daylong rainstorm.

Our Wednesday 4:00 a.m. wake-up call left me examining the Wham Ridge for residual wetness from the rain and a judgment call that Trinity Peak looked like a surer bet. As we did on each day, we got up and got out of camp without breakfast or a hot drink. Breakfast occurred after dawn higher up on the

mountain.

West Trinity Peak has a normal route that goes to the Trinity-Vestal saddle and then a left turn up the ridge. Firm snow greeted us below the saddle and Mark and Susan showed their physical prowess by kicking steps that barely grazed the rain soaked and refrozen surface – a slip would not have been good as we had saved weight by leaving our crampons and axes at camp.

The climb up the ridge involved route finding and rock scrambling with lots of little airy pitches and traverses, but with nothing necessitating roped climbing. We summitted West Trinity before 10:00 a. m. I was finally starting to feel acclimatized! However, the clouds building around the peaks substantiated the decision for an alpine start and an early return to camp.

The views from the summit, as well as from Vestal later, were truly stupendous. To the south, we looked over 10 Mile Creek and No Name Creek drainages to the Monitor with its immense north face and its 20 pitch routes, Pigeon standing sharp and tall, the Chicago Basin threesome of 14 ers, Jagged Mountain with multiple rock fingers, and a host of lesser names. North and east had similar inspirations.

The early return to camp for lunch and afternoon siestas was only slightly marred by minor

rains.

Thursday brought another attempt on Vestal but by then given the storm pattern I was having doubts about the group-size and safely taking them up the Wham. A late decision by Jim to stay in camp to rest for his and Mark's upcoming departure and a vertebrae in my back going out at 4:15 a.m. bending over my boot in camp (where is my chiropractor when I need him!) sealed the safe alternative to climb Vestal by its standard route.

Susan, Mark, and I had a great day on the scramble. We made quick work of the approach and the ascent on steep snow to the Arrow-Vestal saddle. Light scrambling ona rising traverse around the backside brought us to the snow-filled gully. Having left our ice axes on the saddle, we had to opt to climb the rock ribs on the west side of the gully, all of which went well and easy. We were soon deposited onto the narrow summit ridge for a scramble northward to the true summit. Wow, a truly amazing view. We lingered for 45 minutes before departing back down around 10. By 1:00 p.m. we were back in camp.

Having additional plans for CO 14'ers, Jim and Mark left later Thursday afternoon. Susan, Zack and I managed the 9 mile hike down (and then up) in 9 hours on Friday. We opted to ford Elk Creek and unfortunately Susan slipped with her immense pack while climbing out the other side and wrenched her back and neck. We REALLY needed that chiropractor, but had to suck it up.

Back at the Animas there were plenty of trains and those not on a tight budget might consider catching one of the four afternoon trains returning from Silverton to Durango rather than face the 4 miles uphill, and by then in the rain.

But the car never looked so good.

Saturday was a booty day and our scrambling around certain secret ice climbing locations netted us several carabiners and two ice screws, one of which was a Chouinard equipment predecessor to Black Diamond (now will I really

use that museum piece?...stay tuned.)

In sum, 2 and a half peaks in a week was just fine. Last summer Susan, Jutta, Zack and I did the Ruby Lake approach to Pigeon and then Golden Horn in Ice Lake Basin west of Silverton. My two cents is that I'd take either of these truly wilderness trips any day over the crowded Chicago Basin 14'er circuit – but then it's easy for me to say that after I religiously checked all the 14'ers off and only belatedly started on the top 100 that got me to such superior mountains as Pigeon and Vestal. What can I say but speak of all the time wasted on my youth...but then again, any day in Colorado beats a day in PHX during the summer working.

AMC Standing Rule 7-9-01-1 on Executive Meetings of the Board

From time to time as deemed necessary to fulfill its fiduciary duties and to function in a manner so as to treat those items that come before it as confidential with the level of sufficient diligence and confidence appropriate to the issues involved, the President may call an Executive Meeting of the Board. At such a meeting only Board members or those specifically invited to attend the Executive Meeting may be present and take part in the proceedings. Neither the specific nature of the topics involved nor the details of the proceedings will be recorded and reported as normal Board minutes unless specified at the Executive Meeting. You can still get a couple of hours in on the Pinnacle Peak Park Climbers' Trail Improvement Project on this Thursday, July 26th. And then — with a clear conscience — you can gobble cheese and stuff at the completion party that will climax the evening..

It won't be at all bad, heat-wise. The peak shades that whole hillside and there will probably be a breeze that high up above the red tile roofs.

This is one reason Pinnacle Peak was a favorite after-work objective for the 40-odd years before the area was closed to climbing. It was close in, had a short approach and there were myriad problems where the top-roping was easy. And it will be that way again after Scottsdale dedicates its' new park sometime in December.

Do not expect a 24-inch-wide tread with 8-inch risers and handrails on these climber trails. Despite many hundreds of hours of work, they are still narrow, uneven, as natural-looking as it is possible to leave them and still have a clear path to follow with no "high-five" moves required. In other words, you can still bust your buns if you get careless, but at least your body should be right on or close to the marked trail.

It seemed to take less time to write and print the book than it had to climb the mountain. No disrespect intended — just another illustration of how "together" Erik is in everything he does.
